Ministry Description

"All are welcome." Next to our name, these are the boldest, most prominent words on the sign outside of Hope Church. That simple statement holds the breadth and depth of Hope's most fundamental core values and greatest strength: we are a community that embraces diverse spiritual journeys and inclusivity through respect and fellowship. The people of Hope identify with the tenets of progressive Christianity (see Appendix A). In short, for us that means that we are open and affirming, non-dogmatic and supportive of individual freedom of thought. We are lifelong learners who affirm that the teachings of Jesus are but one of many sources of wisdom. It is our desire to find a minister for whom these tenets are equally important, and who is poised to join us in putting those words into action. Hope is looking for a minister who is secure in his or her own faith, and is thus receptive to and accepting of the broad diversity of spiritual paths that is the hallmark of our church in which "all are welcome."

What we value about living in our area

To a person, we value the natural beauty of Door County, with its five state parks, fields and forests, limestone bluffs, fruit orchards, and 300 miles of Lake Michigan shoreline. We value the friendliness of small town life, but also enjoy resources usually found only in larger cities: award-winning schools, multi-library system, quality medical services and accessible world-class art and culture.

1b. SCOPE OF WORK

Full-time Minister Position

The minister shall provide the congregation with spiritual leadership and pastoral care and shall administer the rites and sacraments of the church. The minister will maintain a presence in the church and provide administrative leadership.

Core Competencies

For us, the three core competencies that we believe are critical to our next minister's relationship to the people of Hope are:

- being a warm, kind, compassionate person with a genuine high regard and interest in other people.
- sharing our commitment to progressive Christianity through thought and action.
- engaging in the administrative and committee activities of the church through mutual creative thinking, problem-solving, elbow grease and collaborative leadership.

1c. COMPENSATION AND SUPPORT

The final compensation package will be determined by education, experience, and other qualifications, with attention given to the Wisconsin UCC Compensation Guidelines 2021-2022.

Our preference is for our minister to live in Sturgeon Bay or the surrounding area, close enough to be an integral part of the community.

Peer and professional support is available through the Wisconsin Conference and NE Association. The Wisconsin Conference offers a Communities of Practice program to provide peer colleague support to ministers.

1d. WHO IS GOD CALLING TO MINISTER WITH US?

We envision that our next minister will work in collaboration with the people of Hope to achieve the following goals:

Within Hope UCC:

- To support and facilitate continued healing over lost or otherwise compromised relationships and connections between members and friends at Hope, due to the forced separation caused by the pandemic and difficulties in relationships with our last minister.
- To help further develop the functions and activities of the boards and committees of the church, with an eye for innovation and opportunities for healthy change.
- To pay special attention to the development of the youth ministry, which was so adversely affected by the pandemic.
- To continue to improve our systems for welcoming newcomers, including young people, families, and the many "transplants" who choose to live in Door County in their retirement.
- To continue to improve our online presence via our website and other social media.

Beyond the walls of Hope UCC:

- To continue to demonstrate that Hope is open and affirming, a place where all are embraced, can flourish, and feel "at home."
- To support and participate in community efforts for a sustainable global society founded on respect for nature, universal human rights, social and economic justice.
- To support local needs around sustainable housing, living wage and food insecurity.

• To help us welcome back the groups that use our building and grounds and to facilitate greater use of our indoor and outdoor spaces by community groups.

Language and Church Culture

- English is the language used at Hope.
- Hope UCC has been an Open and Affirming church since 2001. This designation
 is a very important part of our identity, within our walls and in the community.
 We welcome persons of all generations, all points of view, all ethnic
 backgrounds, all sexual orientations and all gender identities. Hope also
 supported the UCC Resolution for Marriage Equality in 2005.
- We value and respect the broad diversity of thought among us. We encourage freedom of expression. Most members and friends of Hope have come here from denominations other than UCC and bring diverse histories and spiritual paths. At Hope, creating an environment in which everyone feels "at home" is one of our top priorities and one of our greatest strengths.
- Hope UCC is a God-centered church, while acknowledging that "God" is an immense, inclusive term, open to a broad spectrum of definitions and interpretations, based on individual beliefs and spiritual paths.
- Hope eschews the trappings of "high church," such as the use of ecclesiastical language, elaborate ritual, use of creeds and rigid formality in our worship service. We honor Christian traditions and the sacraments at Hope, with simple ritual and inclusive language that allow for the broad diversity of spiritual paths that is the hallmark of our church in which "all are welcome."

Using the four areas of excellence named in **The Marks of Faithful and Effective Authorized Ministry of the UCC** (revised edition October 2016), we have identified specific skills and characteristics that we believe will best inform and equip our next minister to help carry out Hope's ministry.

• Exhibiting A Spiritual Foundation

Commitment to life-long spiritual growth and practice, individually and in the community. Hope values our adult forum meetings and discussions with the community, such as the recent Racial Justice forums.

• Nurturing UCC Identity

Commitment to the core values of the UCC: continuing testament, extravagant welcome and changing lives through ecumenism, justice and the full embrace of all persons in the radical hospitality of God. Hope has been an Open and Affirming Church since 2001.

Strengthening Inter- and Intra- Personal Assets

A healthy sense of self as shaped by a personal definition of God, community, and personal experience; the ability to listen empathically, communicate appropriately and keep appropriate confidences. This was reflected in the development of our Relational Covenant and Core Values statements (see Appendix C).

Working Together for Justice and Mercy

Drawing on the ministry of Jesus Christ to confront injustice and oppression while engaging in mission and outreach, such as our ministry with the Latino community and the action at the Texas border.

2. WHO IS GOD CALLING US TO BECOME?

Hope Church, like all churches, found it difficult to thrive as a congregation during the pandemic. Still, we found ways to support one another and to reach out to our neighbors, many of whom were experiencing pain and isolation as well. In the wake of the pandemic we continue to strengthen our congregation and to grow our involvement with the community.

We undertook the following initiatives during 2020-2021 to remain connected yet safe and are still exploring opportunities, as we define our new normal:

- Safety Committee developed Covid safety protocol based on the guidance of the WI Council of Churches and local health officials; completed the Safety Plan and SafeConduct Policy and Procedures which incorporated our original Safe Sanctuary Guidelines.
- **Outdoor Activities** tailgate Christmas cookie exchange and spontaneous Christmas carol singalong; vespers services; and bonfires in our outdoor worship space.
- **Care Team** –monthly phone calls to all members of the congregation during the pandemic; now expanding to care for members who need ongoing support and reaching out to visitors and new members.
- **Online Connections** online and Zoom worship, coffee hour, children's time and committee work during pandemic; continuing to explore balance between online and in-person.
- **Relational Covenant** developed a relational covenant to help us to work together with integrity and respect; review is ongoing.

Hope is committed to being involved in and providing support to our local community. Recent undertakings are:

- Ministry with the Latino Community Requested and received grant monies from the Door County Emergency Response Fund to implement a program, The Latino Emergency Assistance Fund, to assist Latinos in the county who are experiencing financial emergencies resulting from the COVID health pandemic and the subsequent economic crisis. We continue to work with the Hispanic Resource Center to enhance its ability to better serve the target population in the future.
- **Community Halloween Pizza Party** Have held a Halloween Pizza Party for the community for a number of years, which gave a place for families to gather and share pizza and other treats. It attracted hundreds of guests, and we look forward to hosting this wonderful event again post pandemic. Building on its success, we have recently procured a wood-burning, portable pizza oven to expand outreach opportunities beyond this holiday.
- **Action at Texas Border** Provided money and supplies for a Hope member who volunteered at the border with an organization providing hospitality and sanctuary to refugees; hosted a community educational update; and are developing a proposal packet for future direct action efforts.
- **Racial Justice Forums** Offered facilitated forums on Zoom to members and the wider community that focused on the racial tensions in our country. We also identified future action steps to address racial disparities in the local community.

Hope held a Vision 2020 seminar in 2018 that identified our challenges, opportunities, and potential for growth.

- **Challenges:** social justice initiatives, hospitality with new and existing members, welcoming visitors as we communicate who we are and what we do
- Opportunities: diversity in age and ethnicity, developing a strong online presence

The outcomes from Vision 2020 continue to guide our planning as we develop strategies and focus.

3. WHO ARE WE NOW?

3a. CONGREGATIONAL REFLECTIONS

Hope's life of faith

For each of us, there is something at Hope that we cannot get anywhere else. On one hand, one would think that's a tall order, given the diversity of thought and the range of spiritual paths among us that we value so much. On the other hand, there is a common thread that is the glue that holds us together and encourages freedom of expression: love one another. Hope's life of faith is about building relationships that are caring and in which we can be cared for. Hope's life of faith lies in the belief that each of us is loved as we are, by one another and by an inclusive God.

Positive qualities of the Hope congregation

The people of Hope are caring, dedicated, kind, generous, and respectful of one another. We take joy in one another's company and in welcoming newcomers. We care deeply about the world in which we live, and gain understanding, strength, and solace from the teachings of Christianity, as well as other world religions and sources of wisdom. We are practical in the ways we seek to minister to the community around us, primarily through food and outreach programs. The people of Hope are at the forefront of demonstrating what it means to be open and accepting of all persons, without regard to race, color, creed, sexual orientation, sexual identity or past experiences.

Worship at Hope

We have gathered for 140 years as Hope United Church of Christ. Progressive Christianity has been a defining aspect of our church culture. As such, the language in our services reflects our enduring commitment to progressive Christianity, where the teachings of Jesus are central, but other sources of wisdom and insight are examined; where freedom of thought and expression are encouraged; where the importance of social and environmental justice is made real and relevant (See Appendix A).

Worship and faith formation at Hope celebrate the love and grace of an inclusive God. We gather on Sundays for one service in our sanctuary and by Zoom. During the summer, we add a second service in our outdoor worship center. The worship service is designed to create and support a caring and inclusive community. It includes several pieces from our music ministry, readings from the Bible and other sources of wisdom, a message and a prayer. The flow of the service is supported in the sanctuary with screen graphics. On the first Sunday of every month, we have a communion ritual, with

emphasis on its symbolic role of creating unity in community. Baptism is conducted during worship and involves the participation of the entire congregation.

Organization of Hope

The Church Council, chaired by the moderator and composed of committee chairs, provides oversight to all church functions. It receives recommendations from committees and the congregation, and makes decisions regarding budget, policy, positions and focus of the work of the church.

When a decision at Hope needs to be made quickly, it comes to the attention of the Pastor and Moderator who either make the decision or, if time allows, call a special meeting of the Council.

OCWM is 2% of the operating budget. OCWM funds are gathered through donations and the budget.

Hope Church current indebtedness:

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The **prominent mission components** from the ENHANCE Hope campaign include:

- **Spiritual Campus:** Besides enhancing the facility by repairing things that needed attention, we utilized the formerly vacant lot next to Hope Church and now have an outdoor worship center, a labyrinth and meditation garden. They are open to the public for personal spiritual experiences.
- Scholar-in-Residence Program: Three scholars so far have brought new spiritual and diverse learning opportunities to the congregation and community.
- **Family Life Coordinator**: This part-time position has brought new vitality and enthusiasm to our church and the families of Sturgeon Bay. This position is vacant at this time.

Church Endowment Fund

Beyond Hope Church and its current vision, the Hope UCC Endowment Fund represents today, tomorrow, and forever. Grants awarded by the Hope UCC Endowment Fund support our community, both locally and worldwide. Examples include: food assistance programs, care packages for deployed military and support for English language classes for Hispanics, among other grants.

Market value of the endowment fund assets are \$168,011.

Funds are drawn as needed. Annually, the Endowment Committee grants 5% of the principle (about \$5,000) to applicants, including \$1,000 going toward a Hope Scholarship awarded in the spring.

The amount available for draws annually is calculated by taking 5% of the average value of the fund for the previous five years. If less than 5% is drawn, the excess returns to the fund. This process has not changed.

No draws have occurred in the last five years to meet operating budget expenses. Only interest/dividends are drawn. The Hope Church Endowment by-laws mandate that "The original investment of \$21,120.00 must be maintained in the Endowment Fund." Thus, we expect it to continue indefinitely.

Hope Church does not own a parsonage.

Buildings owned by the church

Hope UCC sits on 5.05 acres of land within the city of Sturgeon Bay and county of Door and state of Wisconsin. Built in 1967, the main part of the building houses the sanctuary, business offices, and youth rooms. In 1996 the fellowship hall with art alcoves, kitchen, classrooms and bathrooms were added. The church parcel has a Memorial Garden, outdoor worship area, meditation garden, labyrinth, and other gardens with seating areas.

There are no non-church-owned buildings or other spaces used or rented by the church.

The building and grounds are wheelchair accessible, except for the pulpit and choir risers.

Reflection

Hope UCC leaders and staff are good stewards of the financial resources entrusted to them. The council and treasurer are transparent regarding the financial status of the church. Note that our church applied for and were granted two government pandemic Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans that have subsequently been forgiven. Giving by church members during the pandemic remained strong also, both contributing to our overall financial health. The congregation has a strong and stable presence and is committed to continuing our mission well into the future.

Thanks to the ENHANCE Hope campaign, our mission and ministry were strengthened. The hiring of a Family Life Coordinator (FLC) breathed new life into our family, parent and youth education programs. The FLC is a member of the Board of Education, provides the children's story time during Sunday worship, co-facilitates the Wednesday Night Youth Group meetings with our pastor, co-chaperones youth mission trips such as the Urban Immersion in Milwaukee and assists with Social Life events that involve youth. Pre-pandemic, the FLC facilitated two community parent support groups that we are hopeful will re-start.

3f. HISTORICAL INFORMATION

Significant happenings in the history of Hope Church

- Changes in ministerial leadership The departure of a long-time beloved minister in 1998 led to a difficult and lengthy period of transition. After some years of turmoil and various interim and settled pastors, our next minister stayed and thrived for 9 years. His retirement led to our most recent minister, who left after two years. Hope longs for stability in ministerial leadership.
- Becoming an Open and Affirming church After more than 10 years of study and discussion, Hope became an open and affirming church in 2001. This designation added a new positive dimension to our already welcoming congregation. As we share on Sunday mornings, "Welcome to our church. No matter who you are or where on your life's journey, you are always welcome at Hope."
- Expansion of facilities The addition of indoor space in 1996 brought new opportunities for the congregation and for community organizations. We also have developed our outdoor campus, which includes the Memorial Gardens, a Contemplation Garden, a labyrinth and outdoor worship space.

Most important event in the last 10 years

The capital campaign launched in 2012 enabled us to create a strategic plan to provide for current and future needs. The campaign emerged from a visioning session and subsequent gatherings; the congregation became excited and energized about the future of Hope. More information about this initiative (ENHANCE – Engaging New Hope And New Challenges Every day) is found in the financial section.

Recent specific change

Hope had to learn to adapt to a changing environment in the wake of COVID. The impact is addressed in other sections of this profile.

Processing of conflict

Hope embraces a wide diversity of theological perspectives. We trust one another to use civility to resolve conflicts, primarily through compromise. The policies in the personnel handbook and the work of the Pastoral Relations Committee provide guidance for any emerging concerns regarding pastoral relations. The recent premature departure of our last minister resulted in some division and conflict; we used the experience for a time of introspection. We worked with the Wisconsin Conference Conflict Transformation Team which helped us identify our core values and identity. In addition to the development of a **Relational Covenant and Core Values statement** (Appendix C), we reaffirmed our intentions to work together with mutual respect and kindness.

4. WHO IS OUR NEIGHBOR?

4a. COMMUNITY VISION

Extending outward in service and advocacy

- During the early days of the pandemic, our Mission and Action Board launched
 LEAF, the Latino Emergency Assistance Fund. Because Door County's
 Latino population is relatively small, there are few resources available to them.
 Further, access to resources is difficult without a liaison. Hope has partnered
 with a local Latino outreach worker to create LEAF as a flexible pool of money to
 provide direct assistance with critical needs for Door County's Latino families.
- The **Hope Endowment Fund** is used to award grants to projects that further our mission.
- Hope Church is a regular participant in **Loaves and Fishes Door County**, a community meal program that serves some of our community's most economically disadvantaged people.
- Hope Church welcomes the community to our spiritual campus which includes a memorial garden, a contemplative meditation garden, a worship space and our very own labyrinth. All are invited to walk our grounds and find their own peaceful corner.
- Our **Benevolent Committee** hosts twice-yearly rummage sales that fund grants to worthy charitable organizations.
- Hope Church makes a practice of opening its doors to many programs and community groups that serve Door County, such as **Sturgeon Bay Breakfast Rotary** and **DC Literacy Council.**

Participating in the Wider United Church of Christ

Hope Church has a history of being active in the wider church. These are some recent examples:

- Hope is a **"five for five"** congregation, meaning we financially support all five of the major areas of the wider church.
- Hope sends a delegation to the Annual Meeting of the Conference each year.
- Our previous minister served as the Conference Moderator.
- One of our members serves as **Chair of the Wisconsin Conference Board of Directors**. He also facilitated the creation of the UCC Foundation of Wisconsin.
- We recently sponsored a member to attend the Damascus Project.
- Our choir director has served as the Choir Director of the Conference Choir at its annual gathering.

Transforming lives through UCC initiatives

- Hope Church was the second UCC Church in Wisconsin to declare itself **"open and affirming"** back in 2001.
- In more recent years we adopted the Conference's resolution declaring Hope an "immigrant welcoming" church and have similarly joined the Conference in formally repudiating the anti-indigenous people Doctrine of Discovery.
- A Green Team Committee worked on a **Creation Justice Covenant** and becoming a **UCC Creation Justice Church**. This was put on hold due to the pandemic.
- Hope Church has taken the following steps toward accessibility: wheelchair
 access, large print bulletins and large flat screen monitors for the visually
 impaired, updated technology to the sound system including a hearing loop for
 the hearing impaired, and a camera system along with the necessary hardware
 and software to broadcast the service to those who cannot join us on Sunday.

Participating in interfaith activities

- Inherent in the mission of Hope Church is a respect and appreciation for different faiths. In keeping with our mission, Hope Church encourages opportunities for adults and youth to learn about other faiths through adult forums, youth activities and from the pulpit.
- Hope participates in community interfaith Thanksgiving services as well as interfaith choirs.
- Hope has an ongoing **Scholar in Residence** program to bring in scholars from different faiths to teach us new ways to look at the world. Thus far we've hosted scholars from the Quaker, Jewish and Baha'i faiths.
- Hope's ministers have been involved in two local ministerial associations. Our expectation is that our minister continues to take an active role with these groups and our community. One group is hosted by the hospital chaplains. The other group meets at the facilities of the various churches involved.

Living our Mission Statement Hope Church Mission Statement

People come together at Hope Church for the following purposes:

- To worship God.
- To promote personal and spiritual growth.
- To develop a religious community which encourages tolerance and openness of thought, and accepts diversity of thought and action.
- To search for meaning in life and for understanding of ourselves through the teachings of Christ and other great teachers.
- To understand how all things are related to each other, and to learn how we may best serve our local community and our world community.
- To celebrate with joy the richness of ourselves and our religious community.

Our Hope community continues to affirm its Mission Statement, and we consider it to be the guiding document of our life together. Our expectation is that our minister would strive to follow, and help us to follow, the Hope Church mission in all church activities and endeavors.

4b. MISSION InSite

Our neighborhood and community demographics

- Hope Church is located on a large piece of land in the heart of Sturgeon Bay. We share the neighborhood with Sturgeon Bay Public Schools and its athletic fields. Our church members and friends reflect the demographics of the neighborhood and community which tend to be somewhat older and Caucasian.
- As a community, we are becoming a bit more diverse, particularly with a growing Hispanic/Latino population and a slightly increased African American population.

Shaping our ministry to our changing demographics

- Hope Church is proud to host Literacy Door County, Inc. within our church building. Many members participate as volunteers with their mission of providing one-on-one adult tutoring for basic literacy and English Language Learners.
- The church founded the above-mentioned LEAF program.
- In addition to the Racial Justice Forums, Hope Church has been prominently displaying a Black Lives Matter banner since the spring of 2020, to honor the struggles of people of color due to systemic racism in our society.

I offer the following perspective of Hope United Church of Christ in Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin drawn from my experiences as a retired Lutheran (ELCA) pastor, Past three term member and president of the Board of Education of the Sturgeon Bay Public Schools; A frequent worship attendee; and as a long-time friend of many of Hope's members. It was also a great delight to baptize a granddaughter at a morning worship at Hope.

No one is a stranger at Hope Church. Though you may enter the building for the first time, you walk in as a friend or family member who has come home. You can be sure I've attended many worship services over the years in churches that describe themselves as friendly, but tend to be friendly to themselves. Hope Church has disciplined themselves masterfully in this regard.

Though Hope Church has, what I would call, only a tangential relationship with the classic liturgy of the church, it nevertheless has a form that serves them well. Worship at Hope is "worshipper friendly" not only with a clearly written service bulletin, but also employment of generous use of electronic media to make worship accessible to all. The worship is made available by way of Facebook as well.

To my mind, the balance between theological and intellectual challenges is quite unique. There are no creedal litmus tests people must endure to either worship at Hope or to become members of the parish. People at Hope strike me as being seekers of knowledge, of relationships with one another, and of God as God is revealed through Christ and other spiritual leaders. Pat answers and Hope Church do not go well together. Rather, the members crave being challenged.

I must give a caveat here: From a Pastor's perspective, I would find Hope Church not the easiest congregation to pastor. Those who sought my reflections wanted my honesty, I presume. By this I mean that it takes a very special type of leader to harness a rather free-spirited, might I say, rambunctious group of people to head somewhat in the same direction. But therein lies the excitement of it all. No pastor could possibly remain static with such a group. It would be the opportunity of a lifetime to serve at Hope Church.

But through it all, spirituality, worship, intellect, etc. the people of Hope want a person with a pastoral heart to be at one with them on this astounding journey called life.

Moreover, those who attempt to govern with a firm, inflexible manner rather than lead by example will not win the hearts nor harness the talents and energies that are found within the diversity of this special place.

Minister Job Description

Hope United Church of Christ

Position Title:

Minister

Purpose of Position:

The Minister shall provide the congregation with spiritual leadership, pastoral care, and shall administer the rites and sacraments of the church. The minister will maintain a presence in the church and provide administrative leadership.

Qualifications:

The Minister must be ordained or approved for ordination, having standing in the United Church of Christ. A desire for continuing education is expected.

Responsibilities:

- The Minister will lead worship.
 - o Organize and conduct regular religious services
 - Provide thought-provoking and inspirational messages
 - Use material from many sources of wisdom
 - Interact effectively with the Board of Deacons
 - Conduct special services such as baptisms, weddings, funerals, memorial services and administer religious rites as necessary
- The Minister will be involved in congregational leadership and membership relations.
 - o Be a member of the Church Council, an ex officio member of all Boards and Committees, and have awareness of Board and Committee activities
 - o Offer personal Pastoral Care to those in need
 - o Conduct new-member classes as needed and be actively involved in encouraging membership at Hope Church
 - o Conduct Confirmation classes and/or provide other opportunities for young people to join in full membership of Hope
 - o Assist the Board of Education in planning and organizing the spiritual and religious education programs at Hope Church
 - o Provide regular reports to the Church Council

- o Meet regularly with the Pastoral Relations Committee seeking their assistance in goal-setting and establishing objectives. Report these goals and objectives to the Church Council.
- o Periodically plan and implement goal-setting meetings for the congregation, Church Council, Boards and Committees.
- The Minister will be available at the church.
 - o Be available to counsel church members, friends and community members
 - o Maintain office hours and be available for "drop-in" visits
- The Minister will provide administrative leadership.
 - o Oversee public communication such as the website, social electronic media, newspaper ads, newsletters, etc.
 - o Oversee the work of the staff
 - Meet regularly with staff
 - Facilitate communication among the staff
 - Foster good working relationships
 - Supervise and evaluate staff in consultation with the Personnel Committee
- The Minister will seek multiple opportunities for ongoing interaction with members, friends, and prospective members.
 - o Develop close relationships with the church family
 - o Reach out to prospective members

Accountability:

The minister is accountable to the Church Council and is elected at a Congregational Meeting for an indefinite period of time. The work of the minister and church ministries shall be evaluated biennially, in whole or in part, by the Personnel Committee as directed by the Church Council.

Appendix C

Hope United Church of Christ (UCC) **Relational Covenant**

Created 1-30-2021

We, of Hope United Church of Christ, make an intentional choice to embrace this covenant as an essential part of our faith journey. The following are ways in which we will work together to reach our highest potential as individuals and as a community.

- 1. We aspire to be open, affirming and to encourage everyone to travel their own spiritual path. We are committed to building trust, advocating for justice, and celebrating diversity.
- 2. We treat ourselves and each other with patience and love by listening with compassion and speaking with authenticity.
- 3. We affirm all emotions, take responsibility for our own words and actions, and trust the good intentions of others.
- 4. We affirm that every voice has equal value. In our verbal, written and online communication, we speak directly and in caring, clear, honest, and respectful ways. We refrain from gossip and honor confidentiality.
- 5. We uphold our faith community by participating actively and responsibly in the decision making process and work of the church, as we are able. We reach out to meet the needs of each other and the wider community. We are accountable to each other.
- 6. We create a safe environment for self-disclosure and healthy relationships. When harm is experienced, we acknowledge it, promptly take responsibility, and work to make amends. We practice forgiveness and kindness.
