


Describe how God is calling you to reach out to address the emerging challenges and opportunities of your community and congregation.

In the past, we had a Women's Fellowship, we had Gingerbread House making. Our door is open to The North Bennington School (which is across the street) as a safe place in case of emergency or disaster. We had Easter breakfast, and many other meetings and potlucks to invite the community to participate in. We are always brainstorming creative ideas to have the community involved.

The United Counseling Service (UCS), a local mental health agency, uses our Fellowship Hall for training workshops throughout the year. This organization works hard in our area for solving mental health issues and housing. They reach out all needs in the community.

Greater Bennington Interfaith Counseling Services (GBICS) They have a food pantry, they offer medical services, dental programs, feeding assistance, and housing assistance. This organization is one we support mostly through food pantry, Souper Bowl and mission giving. Our Christmas Eve offering goes directly to this service.

Church building, a beautiful large brick building in the center of town, very near the grade school, a gas station, a restaurant and a couple of stores. It was built around 1873. Parsonage a two-story colonial house directly adjacent to the church. It has 10 rooms, 5 bedrooms 1 ½ baths, large kitchen and dining room, living room, den, front porch, 2-car garage and small yard. We are currently in the process of selling it, so it is not available for minister's residence.

We have a ramp at the back door that comes into the kitchen and then is easy access to fellowship hall and sanctuary for worship.

We do exceptionally well reaching out in our in mission, both local and global, considering our financial challenges, trying to balance expenses and income. Our buildings are big, so maintenance of them is big and difficult. However, we consider mission outreach a high priority. The committees submit a budget proposal to the trustees at budget planning time in November/December. The trustees make the final decision on budget proposal to be presented and voted on at Annual Meeting in February.

3f. HISTORICAL INFORMATION

In 1866, Deacon Henry D. Hall was an organizer of the Congregational Sunday School in Bennington. The school increased rapidly until it numbered over 100. The school continued for nearly two years. It then transferred to the North Bennington Congregational Church.

The 100th anniversary, in 1968 of the North Bennington Congregational Church was a fitting time to recall the mission which informs the life and meaning of our congregation, and of the whole people of God, of which we are a small, but real, part.

The church overflowed with the funeral of Lindy Lynch in 2019. She was a leader in our community and a great friend to our church and church family. Please see insert for more information on this powerhouse of a lady. (For more detailed history please see insert.)

REFERENCE 2 / Setting Kendy Skidmore 19 Coleville Road Bennington, VT 05201

I am writing this letter of recommendation for the North Bennington Congregational Church for their search for a new Pastor. I was the director of the Bennington Coalition for the Homeless for 12 ½ years, during which time the church graciously provided their parsonage to serve as the short-term transitional shelter for homeless families. The shelter occupied the parsonage for several years prior to my tenure and for a short time after. During this time, the Church and its parishioners were supportive and encouraging to me and my staff. The provided financial support, maintained the property to meet all code requirements and were always open to conversations regarding the operations of the shelter, our needs, our concerns, our issues, they were always completely supportive.

Starting a shelter for homeless families was a new and controversial project. During a time when nobody wanted a homeless shelter and its stigmas `in their backyard", the North Bennington Congregational Church stepped up and made sure that this much needed project had a home! They stood by the Coalition for the Homeless during many, many trials and tribulations. It was because of this dedication and commitment to the homeless and hungry that the Bennington Coalition was able to expand its service, erase many of those stigmas, grow and serve many more people. The Coalition moved their services and shelter to a more central location over the past few years, but I will never forget where it started, and that it would not be where it is, or serving who it serves now, if it wasn't for the commitment and faith of the North Bennington Congregational Church!

BRIEF HISTORY OF OUR CHURCH - SUMMARY of Ball belloans

1-3 Significant Happenings in the History of Our Church That Have Shaped Our Identity:

- 1) Organizing a faith community in the beginning as a Sunday School for the mill-working families in town in the year 1868. It started out in a factory office in town, and then the church building was erected in 1873. The initial enthusiasm was to provide a safe and effective environment for the religious education of young people. Sunday School excursions were a big hit as trips were organized for the youth to travel by railroad to lakes within 50 miles for fun and fellowship.
- 2) Projects that benefitted those in need have always been a strong part of our church's mission. Hospital sewing has been an ongoing activity. Early on, sending workers out for mission work around the world was a focus to Turkey, Korea, China, So. America, Spain and India up until 1964.

HOME Inc. (Housing Opportunity Mission, Ecumenical) was a project of 1968 which impacted many lives in the Bennington area. Affordable housing was built and sponsored by this organization, which was founded by members of our congregation and the Pastor, Rev. Bill Abernethy. That housing is still in existence on Beech St. in Bennington. There were both spiritual and material aspects involved to help solve some housing problems for the elderly and those of low income.

3) Our church's ongoing Mission Outreach is remarkable for the size of our congregation – we are small in numbers, but have a big heart for helping people. We support many local service organizations such as BROC (Benn. Rutland Opportunity Council), PAVE (Projects Against Violent Encounters), the VT Veterans Home in Benn., Open Arms (Support for Afghanistans relocated in our area), Meals on Wheels, Turning Point (Addiction Recovery Program), GBICS (Greater Benn. Interfaith Community Services), the Kitchen Cupboard, and we have Wal-Mart Gift Cards available for those in need. We provide global outreach to Doctors Without Borders.

Important Event in the Last Ten Years:

We held informational sessions/forums to discuss the topic of "Open and Affirming" Then at our Annual Meeting in February of 2019, we voted unanimously to become an "Open and Affirming" congregation, officially declaring our warm acceptance and welcome to all.

History Summary:

Deacon Henry D. Hall was the organizer of the Congregational Sunday School in North Bennington. It began in a factory office and soon increased to a number over 100. Many thought a Congregational Church should be organized in the village. In 1868, the first meeting of 21 members was held in "Bank Hall" and Rev. Leavitt Bartlett was called as the first Pastor. The Sunday School at the mill was discontinued and it became the Sunday School of the North Bennington Congregational Church with 195 members

enrolled that year. The Boot and Shoe Co. and the H.C. White Co. were prosperous businesses in town which brought many families and devoted Christian workers.

Meetings were held in Bank Hall until a church was built in 1873 at the cost of \$15,000. Through the years, the properties were expanded and improved attesting to the interest and support of the leaders and members of the congregation.

Our congregation voted to join The United Church of Christ in 1961, four years after the formation of the UCC in 1957 which was the bringing together of the Congregational – Christian Church and the Evangelical – Reformed Church.

Over the years, Sunday School was a highlight of our ministry and Music was a strong aspect of our inspiring and meaningful worship services. Members have been very generous, too, in supporting the Lord's work in this place.

Even though in recent decades, our congregation has decreased in size, our history is rich and our faith and commitment is a strong witness for the work and mission of this congregation. We have been blessed by the Pastoral Leadership of many wonderful Pastors from the beginning (there have been 23 settled Pastors) and our current Pastor, Rev. Penny Rich Smith, has served the longest – she has served our church for 27+ years. There have been wonderful celebrations along the way as well as challenging times, but we have persevered and remained a warm, friendly, caring congregation.

We hope to move forward with great faithfulness and hope for decades to come!


