The expected living situation for our next minister.

Within a 30-minute drive of the church. The congregation is situated close to several major cities and towns. The congregation does not provide a parsonage.

How our church will adopt part-time adjustments in the pastoral schedule to support a minister's bi-vocational employment.

We have creative lay leaders who can respond by using effective communication and creative initiative. Our current structure looks like two sermons each month, one worship that has centering prayer instead of a sermon, one worship that has a focus on creation care with a reflection or short sermon, and in addition to this there is a lay-led Bible study for adults, and an active spiritual caregivers group. Lay members help lead services when pulpit supply is not available. Each week lay members help with ushering, scripture reading, serving communion, and greeting at the door to the church.

The WI Conference, UCC provides Seminary Debt Reduction Grants, which are based on need and may be renewed annually for up to 5 years. The WI Conference offers support for authorized ministers through a robust Communities of Practice (COP) program.

The WI Conference also offers continuing education grants. The Damascus Project, an online learning community offered through the WI and MN Conferences, provides a variety of opportunities for continuing education. The WI Conference encourages both the personal and professional growth of authorized ministers through its Coaching program.

Who Is God Calling Us to Become?

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." (Matthew 22:37 NRSV)

Who God is calling us to become as a congregation.

God is calling us to live into our Mission statement more deeply (Wonder, Welcome, and Worship.) We Wonder with purpose, ask questions, celebrate differences, examine scripture, and embrace diversity; to Welcome our circle of neighbors, shower love and blessing throughout our community, and to care for creation; and to Worship in all that we do, and in ways that help our hearts to sing, nourish bodies, minds, and souls so that all are fed, and none leave the table hungry. We believe the table can always get bigger. Grab another plate and sit down. Or as Pete said at a recent meeting, "I'm Home."

How God is calling us to reach out to address the emerging challenges and opportunities of our community and congregation.

We design community events that broaden the ministry beyond the walls of the building. We engage in outreach in traditional ways such as prayer chains and visiting. We also find unique ways to reach out to our community and invite them in such as movie nights, bake sales, bonfires and local summer festivals.

We created a little free pantry in the parking lot which is filling needs using donated gifts and local produce when in season. We are working on developing a community garden for area residents and church members to use for growing food and flowers.

We have received Kairos grants and are a Creation Justice Church. We have developed a Creation Care Sunday each month to build up the skills of lay leaders in worship since receiving this grant. We believe in a big outreach by being the church in the community. This grant also allowed us to employ one of our young adults to lead several art workshops for the community.

We also partner with local organizations and community groups for one-time initiatives such as an Advent toy drive, and a blanket drive in the winter with Neighbors Helping Neighbors. We hosted an overdose response training and now host an OAK box which has drug overdose supplies and education materials.

We do demonstrate an independent streak. It isn't unusual for worship to include opposing points of view as we have a spectrum of political and theological beliefs in our community. However, we are caregivers who love and care for each other and those differences are respected and honored. We often express we want to keep unity and peace and approach contentious issues softly with each other to find common ground, instead of calling attention to differences. We are a big family that is used to having

people drop in – we have all the conflicts and comfort of a small family church. We are emotionally healthy in the sense that we have the deep relationships to work through conflict and come out the other side with understanding and a sense of resiliency.

We have a ramp at the front of the church making the first floor accessible. We also have an entrance to the kitchen and fellowship hall making the lower level accessible also. The handicap accessible restroom is available on the lower level. Both levels of the church are wheelchair accessible.



Historical Information

Significant happenings in the history of our church that have shaped the identity of our congregation.

In 2019, an extensive remodeling of the lower level and immediate outdoor area made the Church handicap accessible. In 2020, solar panels were installed on the roof, significantly decreasing the cost of electricity.

2015 - Open and Affirming Process was a big change in the church that resulted in some people leaving, and some people living into a more inclusive welcome for LGBT people. Our congregation still has a spectrum of political and theological beliefs including around gender identity and sexuality. While a majority of members support our Open and Affirming spirit, we continue to stay in loving relationship with members who have a different position or response to LGBTQ issues and look forward to living fully into our ONA designation.

2021 - Kairos/Creation Care Process empowered us to focus on our love and relationship with God's Creation. We have installed solar panels, try to be low waste.

The Caregiver Committee is charged with coordinating the distribution of fruit baskets, visitation, and cards to those going through difficult times.

We engage in various types of missionary support including Jon and Marijane Beutler and their family. We serve locally through a Neighbors Helping Neighbors blanket drive and FFA toy drive.

We are an Open & Affirming congregation. We mention these values in our welcoming statement, our welcome is clear on our website and Facebook page, and we support the PFLAG connection, and the local pride parade.

Creation Justice: We celebrate creation justice through a dedicated service each month, the installation of solar panels on our roof, a community garden, and a prairie plot.

Lay-led Bible Study each Sunday creates a circle of people who share, explore, and pray together.

Ministry of Hospitality: Easter breakfast, potlucks with movie nights, potluck after church, and bonfires with a meal.

We have a Little Free Pantry in the parking lot.
